

Maryland FLL Judging Overview

Prior to the Qualifying Tournament

- prepare by following the instructions given on the FIRST Lego League website for each of the three judged areas (Robot Design, Project, and Core Values)
- <http://www.firstlegoleague.org/challenge/thechallenge>
- bring at least three team info sheets to provide the judges in each judging room
- *the Robot Design Executive Summary and Core Values Poster will not be used in Maryland FLL*

At the Qualifying Tournament

- Judging takes place
 - in a closed room, in a 10 minute session
 - only one adult may accompany the team into the judging room to observe
 - the adult may record the session, but will not be allowed extra time to set up
 - the adult may not speak to, prompt, or guide the students in any way
 - all students should participate in each judging session—in the project presentation, core values activity, and in answering judge questions
- **Project Judging Session**
 - teams should bring
 - entire team
 - team information sheet
 - props or visual aids required for the presentation
 - be wary of relying on technology
 - laptops may go to sleep or lock
 - projectors may need to warm up
 - many qualifying tournament sites will not have Wi-Fi
 - team will be given five minutes for their presentation including setup
 - judges will then have five minutes to ask questions about the project
 - teams will be evaluated based on the Project Rubric
 - take specific note of the rubric items with red asterisks
- **Core Values Judging Session**
 - teams should bring
 - entire team
 - team information sheet
 - there may be a two to five minute teamwork activity (qualifier-dependent)
 - successful completion is irrelevant—judges look at how well the students interact as a team
 - judges will then ask the students questions about how the team demonstrates FLL Core Values
 - teams will be evaluated based on the Core Values rubric
 - *Maryland FLL does not use the Core Values poster*

- **Robot Design Judging Session**

- teams should bring
 - entire team
 - team information sheet
 - robot with mission code loaded and all attachments
 - printed code for one to two missions to show the judges
- be prepared to demonstrate one or two of the team's best missions on a full FLL field
- team is then interviewed by the judges for the remainder of the session
- students should be prepared to discuss their design and strategy decisions
- teams will be evaluated on the Robot Design rubric
- *Maryland FLL does not use the Robot Design Executive Summary*

- **Awards & Advancement**

- Champion's Award
 - team with best overall rankings in Project, Core Values, and Robot Design
 - in the Project, this team must
 - identify a problem,
 - propose an innovative solution,
 - and share that solution with their community
 - minimum required ranking in Robot Performance (top 40%)
 - *automatic bid to state championship*
- Project/Robot Design/Core Values Awards
 - team with best ranking in the category
 - requires good scores in each of the subcategories of the category
- Robot Performance
 - based solely on robot performance rounds in the afternoon
 - may be won alongside other awards
- General Award Information
 - with the exception of the Robot Performance award, FLL awards are determined by a deliberation process, which is formulated around discussion of team performance in each judged category
 - additional awards vary by qualifier
 - teams must participate in all three judged areas and the robot rounds to be eligible for any awards or advancement to the state championship
 - any team not demonstrating the FLL Core Values is disqualified from winning any awards—including robot performance—or advancing to the state championship
- Advancement to State
 - based on Champion's award criteria, not on specific awards
 - team with best overall rankings in Project, Core Values, and Robot Design and meeting the Robot Performance threshold
 - ***teams may win awards without advancing and may advance without winning awards***
- After the Tournament
 - teams will receive a copy of the rubrics filled out by judges
 - rubrics will contain constructive criticism—please read through the rubric before sharing it with the team
